

CHIEFTAIN OF THE DAY WALLY CLARK

We are honored today to have as our Chieftain, Wally Clark; someone who is very familiar to most of you. He has been involved in Northwest pipe bands for thirty years.

Wally is the one right up front, the Drum Major. He marches with military precision; which is not surprising when on knows of his background.

Wally was born in Dumbarton, Scotland, and raised there until he was twelve years od. His parents moved to the north of England. He was active militarily for many years; during seven years of World War II, and ten years of Territorial Army, Britain's equivilent of our Army Reserves; he participated in the King's Own Scottish Borderers. Wally rose to the rank of Captain.

Wally met his wife, Molly, during the War. She was in the Women's Army. They went through the Blitz together, surviving many air raids. They wed in 1941, in Portsmouth, England. They have five children, three sons and two daughters. By the way, two sons are pipers.

Wally and his family came to the United States in 1956. He worked for Lockheed for five years, and then Boeing, from which he eventually retired.

Wally is an Associate Fellow in the Royal Aeronautic Society, a Fellow of the British Interplanetary Society, and a Chartened Engineer.

We welcome this most distinguished gentleman as our Chieftain of the Day; and thank Wally for passing knowledge of pipe bland drilling to so many West Coast bands. He has done much to further Scottish traditions in the United States.

DANCING RULES


- 1. Games are open to dancers from Washington, Oregon and Idaho only.
- 2. Age of dancers shall be given as of Sat. June 21, 1986.
- 3. Entry fee must accompany the entry form, or entry will not be accepted.
- 4. Classification of dancers will be as specified on page 28 of the S.O.B.H.D. rules, Baby, Beginner, Novice, Intermediate, Advanced Intermediate and Open.
- 5. The Dancing Committee reserves the right and privilege to alter or change the schedule of events and combine classes.
- 6. Dance steps must be taken from the S.O.B.H.D. textbooks.
- 7. Dancers will forfeit entry fee if not present when their class starts.
- 8. Dancers must dance to the Pipers provided and fill in for reels as required.
- 9. Decision of the Judge shall be final.
- 10. Dancers must be in costume to receive awards.
- 11. Pre-open dancers must present registration cards before receiving awards.
- 12. Any protest must be accompanied by a \$5.00 deposit which is refundable only if the protest is valid.
- 13. National dance points will be combined with Highland points to figure Aggregate Trophy winners.

DRUMMING RULES

- 1. A Novice is an individual who has not competed as an Amateur or who has not won two or more Novice events.
- 2. Each contestant must provide his/her own piper.

PIPING RULES

- 1. A minimum of 3 competitors are required for a 1st place monitary prize.
- 2. A minimum of 5 or more competitors are required for 3 places. 1 place only if less than 3 competitors.
- 3. T.H.G. Board retains the right to cancel competition due to lack of participants.


