



THE GRAHAM FAMILY


ncholars have long debated whence came the name Graham. Some say the Grahams are descendants of the Graeme who commanded the armies of Fergus II in 404 AD. Others are equally convinced that they are of Norman descent, while yet others claim a Flemish or even Danish Descent. Even the early officers of Clan Graham Society could not agree, with first president Harry L. Graham holding to a Norman connection although first Society Genealogist J. Kenneth Graham was in the Pictish Scott (Graeme) camp. Which is correct? We will examine the writings of these and other scholars and let you draw your own conclusions.

Harry I. Graham and researcher Thomas Dickson Graham of Clearwater Florida, wrote in From Whence the Montrose Grahams (1979) "William de Graham was the youngest son of William de Tancarville of Danish descent, and Matilda d' Arques, direct descent of the Anglo-Saxon and Danish Kings. The father was a baron of Normandy, and went to England with William the Conqueror in 1066, and for his services received a great barony in Lincolshire called Grantham. He also had great properties in Normandy. Eventually he turned his Norman properties over to his eldest son, Rabel and moved to England where he later became


Treasurer for King Henry I and Justice of England.

"William de Graham was born about the time of the Norman invasion, whether in Normandy or in England is unknown, probably Normandy. As soon as he was old enough, he became Seneshal (business manager) for his father at the Barony of Grantham in Lincolnshire, England. He took the name William de Grantham which was soon shortened to William de Graham (sometimes written Graeme). The book, The Norman People, says "In all the early records of England, Graham means Grantham in Lincoln, and William de Graham settled in Scotland in the time of King David I, (1124-1153) and obtained Abercorn and Dalkeith.

"The English branches of the de Tancarvilles were generally named Chamberlain. The banner of the Chamberlains of Lincoln bore three escallops, which also appear in the arms of de Graham or de Grantham, originally from Lincoln. (Sir John Graham of Dundaff carried a banner with three golden escallops on a field of black. The same three golden escallops are a part of the Montrose Coat of Arms). From this family descended the famous Marquis of Montrose and the brave Viscount of Dundee, also Sir James Graham of Netherby, the eminent statesman."

Joe is a member of the Board of Directors of the Scottish Rite Scholarship Foundation of Washington. He also serves as co-chairman of the Bremerton Valley of the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry.



James Barrie - Piping Judge

James Barrie now lives on Vancouver Island in British Columbia. At an early age, he learned to play the bagpipe from his father William Barrie, who himself was taught in the renowned *Cameron* style of playing Piobaireached by the late J. Macdougall-Gillies and P/M Robert Reid. He is a talented musician and has produced three recordings of Piobaireached music under the accompaniment to his father's voice on the recording.

Judy Morrison - Piping Judge

Judy has been piping since the early 1970's, instructed by Andrew Wright, Bob Hardie, Donald Morrison and Evan MacRae. Scottish Field Events

The Scottish field events have been a part of the Highland Games for centuries. Some say that the events derive from tests of skill used by Clan chiefs to select the strongest warriors that could lead the Clansmen into battle. Others believe that these competitions were organized to control the brawling and to arouse each rival by displaying strength and skill.

Stone Toss: Each competitor must stand firmly planted, and push a large rock through the air. Competitors are not permitted to complete any running or spinning to assist the throw.

Hammer Toss: Two types of hammers will be used today - 16 and a 22 pound hammer. Competitors stand with their backs to the field and begin to swing the hammer several times above his head. This swinging allows the weight to pick up momentum. The competitor must release the hammer to let it fly straight behind him over the treag. This is measured for distance.

Weight for distance: Two standard weights for this event include - 28 pound and 56 pond weights. The competitor, getting a running star, spins to gain momentum, then must toss the weight before it throws him over the treag. It is measured for distance.

Weight for Height: In this event, the competitor swings the weight over his head, over a bar higher than any other competitor. As the competitors qualify, the bar is raised inches at a time until a winner is found, each competitor has three tries to clear the bar before he is out of the competition.

The Caber Toss: A Caber is a large, straight pole, usually 15 to 18 feet long and weighing 90-120 lbs. A competitor has to balance the caber against his arms and shoulder, then lift it and quickly cup the narrow end in his hands. He then begins to run or walk to get momentum built up in the top end. At just the right moment, he plants his feet, pushes the pole forward with his shoulders and lifts the end up and over. The perfect throw is when there is a perfectly straight imaginary line from the competitor's feet through one end to the other end of the pole.



Circle of the Clans

The Clans first took hold in the Highlands of Scotland in the beginning of the 14th century. The word Clan is the Gaelic word for children and the idea of the Clans is very much linked to the idea of family or kinship. But while the members of a Clan consisted of anyone who followed the sphere of influence of the Chief. Scotland has been cut by nature into various mountain chains, which are divided, from one and another by steep sided valleys. The families who lived in each valley were so isolated from each other that that they led completely different lives and became loyal to the ruling Chief of their region In each valley was a different leader with his own following, called a Clan. The Chief did not have control of the land itself but, because he had support of the people in his region, he was considered a powerful force to be reckoned with.

The Clan representatives will be happy to offer assistance in tracing your Scottish roots or helping those who have an interest in things Scottish.




